**Cindy Butts**

Cindy has over 20 years of experience improving access to justice, tackling inequality and complaints handling. She currently has a portfolio career which includes being a Lay Member of the House of Commons Speaker's Committee for the Independent Parliamentary Standards Authority, a Lay Member of the House of Lords Conduct Committee and also serves as an Independent member of the Press Recognition Panel's Nominations Committee. In March 2021 Cindy was appointed by the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) to Chair the Independent Commission for Equity in Cricket (ICEC).

Cindy also has extensive experience in senior public sector recruitment; assisting Government Ministers in appointing Non-Executive Directors to a range of Non-Departmental Public Bodies.

She previously held a Crown appointment as a Commissioner at the Criminal Cases Review Commission and formerly served as a Commissioner at the Independent Police Complaints Commission. Prior to this she was the Deputy Chair of the Metropolitan Police Authority where she had responsibility for setting the strategic direction of the Metropolitan Police Service and chaired a range of inquiries most notably into race and faith, gun and Knife crime and co-chaired the Domestic Violence Board alongside Baroness Helena Kennedy.

Cindy has advised various international Governments on police oversight and citizen engagement, most recently advising the South African Government on legislative reforms to police oversight.

She is a Trustee of the charity Kick it Out which is striving to eradicate all forms of discrimination in football and is a Visiting Fellow of BPP University.

Tracie strategically leads the inclusion portfolio of work for the People Directorate in Leadership and Lifelong Learning (LLL) as part of her portfolio within the EDI function. Tracie crafted the knowledge enhancing work of Building Leadership For Inclusion (BLFI), that has influenced a suite of interventions for the NHS - to raise the level of ambition on inclusion, quicken the pace of change, and ensure that leadership is equipped to achieve and leave a sustainable legacy on inclusion.

Tracie is also the designer and host of the Racial Justice Seminar Series, the first of its kind for the NHS as part of the Executive Suite of offers for LLL.

Best known for her inspiration and insight in relation to progressing social justice and inclusion across systems; Tracie is a leadership development and OD practitioner who designs and implements effective and ethical leadership strategies, which have at their heart justice, inclusion and sustainability. She's an experienced executive coach and a Visiting Professor who has spoken and lectured on leadership and inclusion nationally, working with government representatives and other bodies to address these themes across the public sector. She is the Lead midwife/co-chair of CNO CMiDO BME Strategic Advisory Group NHS England and uses this role to advise and provide guidance on the issues facing patients and staff from minority ethnic groups. She is President of Nigerian Nurses Charitable Association UK.

Wendy has championed numerous project and initiatives beyond the UK's borders, stretching from Europe to African countries. She is a founding member of Better Health for Africa UK, an expert and resource group for shaping African healthcare. Her project participation stretched her to being a member of the Diaspora Healthcare Initiative steering group. She is the proud convener of NHS @70 Nigerian Healthcare Professionals UK Awards 2019. She is also the founder of National BAME Health and Care Awards and Society of African and Caribbean Midwives (SoAC) UK.

Wendy has received numerous accolades within the span of her praiseworthy career. The most recent, she was awarded a British Empire Medal (BEM) for service to the NHS and Equality during the COVID-19 response in the 2021 New year's Honour list.
